

Developmental Language Disorder (DLD): information and resources for professionals

DLD is a life-long condition characterised by differences with understanding and/or using spoken language. DLD has no single known cause and is likely a result of a number of biological, genetic and environmental risk factors. DLD affects social interaction and can significantly impact on emotional and mental wellbeing. It is more prevalent than autism affecting approximately 2 pupils in every mainstream class of 30. It is very important to note that DLD affects every individual differently and there are a wide variety of ways in which language problems may present and evolve over time. DLD can be difficult to diagnose with some children and young people's good language skills masking those that are causing problems.



Our SLT for Schools course is freely available to everyone, so whether you're a teacher or a student, you can improve your understanding of children with SLCN and speech and language development needs.


You can access this free, reusable online training directly from our website, set a schedule that fits your needs, and learn in your own time."
